Definition	non-fictional composition that forms an independent
	part of a publication such as of a newspaper or magazine
Purpose	wide range possible: inform create interest engage reader influence entertain etc.
Some aspects of content and structure	 special features: headline (to attract attention) clear paragraphs structure: inverted pyramid (the most important information comes first, more details follow in the order of their importance) lead (usually the first sentence or paragraph of a story) contains the most important/interesting point ending may refer to the lead descriptions, examples, anecdotes etc. possible quotes, figures, etc. may be included the article has to fit in with the newspaper/mag in which it will be published the writer's approach can vary (e.g. subjective, objective)
Some aspects of language and style	diction: - reader is often addressed directly/inclusive language - stylistic devices - vivid and descriptive language - headline
